# **SNAPlette: Molten Pool Modeling**

- **PWR Vessel** 
  - No penetrations modeled
- Finely nodalized lower plenum
  - 8 elevationa
  - 6 rings
- Lower Head Nodalization
  - 9 segments in hemisphere
  - 4 heads in cylindrical section
  - 10 layers thick
- 1 CV external with water pool
- 1 CV in lower plenum
- Initialized with PD in lower plenum at 2250 K
  - . Effective UO2/ZrO2 Melt Temperature = 2200 K
- Uses 'model' to calculate heat transfer from particulate debris to lower head
- Things to observe:
- Temperature peak at metallic molten layer
- Thinning of vessel at bottom
- Things to try
  - This uses the interactive temperature model. Try using the eutectic model.

# •Pebble Bed Reactor (PBR) Fuel/Matrix g Components

- Fueled part of pebble
- <sup>-</sup>ueled pebble Unfueled shell is modeled as separate component (Matrix)
- Fuel radial temperature profile for sphere
- Provides peak and surface pebble temperature
- Modified for unfueled central core

### Prismatic Modular Reactor (PMR) Fuel/Matrix Components

- More "rod-like" geometry
- Fuel compacts represented as fuel component
- Part of hex block associated with a fuel channel is matrix component
- Fuel radial temperature profile for cylinder

# MELCOR/CONTAIN-LMR Implementation

Implement sodium as replacement to the working fluid for a MELCOR calculation

- •Implement properties & Equations Of State (EOS) from the fusion safety database
- Na (tpfna), FLiBe (tpffi), Pb-Li (tpflipb), He (tpfhe), N2(tpfn2)
- •Implement properties & EOS based on SIMMER-III

### Implementation and Validation of: •Sodium spray fires

- Based on NACOM spray model from BNL
- Input requirement: fall height, mean diameter and source
- Droplet acceleration model
- Internal droplet size distribution (11 bins) from Nukiyama-Tanasama correlation
- Reactions considered:
- ° (S1) 2 Na +  $\frac{1}{2}0_2$  → Na<sub>2</sub>0,
- $\circ$  (S2) 2 Na +  $0_2 \rightarrow Na_2 0_2$
- •Sodium pool fires
  - Based on SOFIRE II code from ANL
    - Reactions considered:
      - 2 Na +  $O_2 \rightarrow Na_2O_2$ , 10.97 MJ/kg
      - $\circ$  4 Na + O<sub>2</sub>  $\rightarrow$  2 Na<sub>2</sub>O, 9.05 MJ/kg

# **MELCOR Heat Pipe Reactor Modeling**

HPs replace conventional convective heat transfer between the fuel and coolant channel with the energy transfer from the fuel to the evaporative region of the HP. Heat rejection from the HP model at the condensation interface is transferred to the CVH package.

Distinct wall and working fluid region nodalization. MELCOR accommodates HP models of different fidelity through a common interface.

- Model 1: working fluid region modeled as high thermal conductivity material
- Model 2 (new in 2020 release): thermodynamic equilibrium approximation of working fluid (sodium or potassium EOS). P, T and liq/vap fraction evolve in time. Sonic, capillary and boiling limits enforced.
- If needed, higher fidelity models straight-forward to implement to interface.

MELCOR heat transfer paths enable radial (lateral) heat transfer in the core among multiple HP regions and to other MELCOR structures.

• Thermal resistance network approximation across heterogeneous domain

At failure, HP materials and regions transition to COR and CVH modeling.





# Molten Salt Reactors

# Properties for LiF-BeF2 have been added

- •Equation of State (current capability)
- •Thermal-mechanical properties (current capability)
- •EOS for other molten salt fluids would need to be developed
- Two reactor types envisioned •Fixed fuel geometry
  - TRISO fuel models (current capability)
- •Liquid fuel geometry

Molten Salt Reactor

0

- MELCOR CVH/RN package can model flow of coolant and advection of internal heat source with minimal changes (current capability)
  - Framework for fission thermal power generation without COR package (current capability)
    - Control volumes defined as "vessel" type or "loop" type
    - Specify axial/radial power profile shape and magnitude (over "vessel" type CV's)
    - Specify flow paths constituting transitions between vessel and loop
    - Preserve decay heat deposition capabilities (CVH/RN1 tracks decay heat from aerosol/vapor already)
- COR package representation no longer applicable, but structures can be represented by HS package (current capability)
- Calculation of neutronics kinetics for flowing fuel (under development)

Thermochemistry modeling using Thermochimica (under development)





# Generalized Radionuclide Transport and Retention (GRTR)

- Capability to define arbitrarily many new radionuclide forms that are: •Sectionwise distributed (with size bins) or non-sectionwise distributed (no size bins), and
- Identified with either pool phase, atmosphere phase, or HS surface (deposition)

Built-in radionuclide forms are preserved (vapor and aerosol in the pool or atmosphere phase) as is heat structure deposition of built-in forms

User defines mass transfer processes applying between forms within classes:

- •Between GRTR forms, or
- •From GRTR forms to built-in forms, or
- •From built-in forms to GRTR forms, but NOT from built-in forms to built-in forms

Unique rule for each class for a given mass transfer process, and the rule is either control function specified or some built-in modeling alternative

### MSRE Pump Coast-down Compensating reactivity.

Benchmark to MSRE pump coastdown

- •Critical at "zero-power" (10 W) and full flow, then initiate a coast-down to zero flow
- •Control system intervenes to preserve criticality, thus the control reactivity trace maps flow reactivity
- •Pump flow data and control system reactivity response documented in ORNL-4233



Documented in forthcoming NURETH-19 paper

# Non-LWR Demonstrations Calculations

- •Provide insights for enhancing source-term regulatory guidance

  - ° Identify key accident characteristics influencing source terms
  - Highlight important uncertainties influencing accident progression and source terms

# Electric Heater Element Modeling

Electrical Heater Elements are frequently used to simulate nuclear heat generation in fuel rods

- •Voltage across bundle and resistance of fuel rods determines power generation
- •Local resistivity dependent on local temperature.
- •Temperature feedback determines the power distribution in the bundle

### MELCOR modeling

- •Historically, users would model with a specially compiled MELCOR executable
- •With the release of MELCOR 2.0, an internal model was available not requiring special compilation.
  - Parameters were specified by input.
  - Model was severely limited since it was specifically based on one particular experiment.
  - Did not allow more than 2 rings for heater elements
- •New model uses a high level control function that leverages ranges and vector control functions.
  - User specifies a range of COR cells and power functions for each ring in that range.
  - Allows multiple materials for elements (W, Cu, Mo)
  - Allows specification of electric losses external to elements
  - HTML expanded to include electrical heating element
    - resistivity as a function of temperature.
    - Video of temperature evolution.



# Improvements to Lower Head Model

Spheroidal Lower Head
Generalization of hemisphere model to allow for an oblated lower cap
Users specify two dimensions: a horizontal radius and a vertical radius

### Melting Lower Head

- •Debris relocating to the lower head contains sufficient decay heat to lead to melting of the interior surface of the lower head.
- •Though MELCOR already accounts for the reduction in load-bearing material as the lower head melts, it does not allow the melted material to become part of the COR package where it

• can affect heat transfer (focusing effect) of molten materials,

- can be oxidized (contributing to hydrogen production),
- $^{\circ}$  can be transferred to the CAV package for MCCI.
- •This code modification will source steel into the calculation along with the associated thermal energy where the COR package then takes control for further relocation

Historically, MELCOR had a specific set of oxidizable material:

Zirconium, Stainless-steel, Graphite, B<sub>4</sub>C, Aluminum
Now extended to use the userdefined materials (UDMs)

General Oxidation Model makes use of the new UDMs to create a new oxidizable material.

Define a reactant core material, COR-USER-METAL, and its oxide product, COR-USER-OXIDE.User permitted to fully specify material properties

# MELCOR definition of a "meta-volume" region

 $\overline{P}_q$ 

ħ

"a grouping of interconnected CVs that share the same reference *thermodynamic* pressure  $\overline{P}_q$ "

Kinematic Pressure  $(\check{P}_i)$ 

- Defined for each control volume "*i*".
  - As in current MELCOR
- Driving potential for flow
  - The kinematic pressure is used to enforce mass conservation between CVs within a meta volume region.

Thermodynamic Pressure,  $\overline{P}_q$ , is a function of:

- Used in EOS evaluations
- the total geometric volume  $\overline{V}_q$ ,
- the internal energy  $E_{i,\varphi}$  of each field  $\varphi$ ( $\varphi = 1,2$ ) in the meta volume CVs "*i*", and
- the constituent masses "*m*" in each field in all of the CVs, M<sub>i,m,φ</sub>.
- Alleviates artificial pressure instabilities from vanishing volumes

Only one value for the entire meta-volume group of CVs.

# MELCOR Modeling Guide (Volume IV)

- User Guidance
  - MELCOR has a steep learning curve and guidance is needed to help new users learn how to develop input decks.
    - Generate non-proprietary plant decks
      - BWR, PWR, SFP
    - Volume IV references these sample plant decks
  - Provide meaningful insights, recommendations, demonstrations of modeling methodology in a formal report for many commonly asked questions across much of the model space
  - Describe pitfalls and methods for troubleshooting and assessing results.
    - How to address code execution problems
    - How to review results to know the code is giving reasonable results
- Best Practices
  - Provide guidelines for appropriate use of the code in modeling severe accidents.
    - Recommended models and model options

# Modernization of MELCOR Development Environment

Objectives: •Expand/enhance testing •More efficient development – release cycle

The overall intent of these efforts has been to migrate the MELCOR software development operations to an environment that allows the development process to be more readily update to current industry state-of-the-art in software development tools, from compilers to development and testing environment. The effort has automated a significant range of testing and code release processes that is enabling more extensive code testing and a more frequent code release cycle to ensure that new features and bug fixes are made available to users in a more timely manner.

# Modernization of MELCOR Development Environment

### 1. Moved from subversion to git for our revision control system,

Git replaces Subversion (SVN) as our version control system. The main distinction between Git and SVN is that Git uses a distributed repository while SVN uses a centralized repository. A distributed repository allows developers to check out a complete copy of the repository on a local system which then becomes independent in that it does not require online access for a complete history of code changes. While this can be advantageous, this was not the dominant reason for changing to Git. Git is more easily integrated with CMake and auto-testing and we foresee long-term support of git as a solution with greater support at Sandia National Laboratories.

### 2. Moved to CMake for our build system,

CMake is used to build MELGEN/MELCOR executables in a consistent manner across multiple platforms using simple platform and compiler independent configuration files that are used to generate native makefiles and workspaces. CMake replaces in-house developed build scripts which are difficult to automate and maintain across multiple platforms.

### 3. Updated to Intel OneAPI compilers from Intel 11.1 as the default compiler,

The latest version of the Intel compiler, v2021.6.0, fully supports the Fortran 2008 and Fortran 2018 standards. This enables features such as enumeration, submodules (faster more efficient compilation), polymorphic objects and classes, and other modern programming features. Before the changeover to the new compiler could take place it was necessary to update some existing code in order to obtain a version that compiled on all platforms, running the test cases in the repository with minimal impact on key test results.

### 4. Moved our entire development operations to GitLab.

# **MELCOR Modernization - Git Branches**

Developers work independently in branches

new models.

- Share development work back with other developers and the official release version.
- Allows developmental work to progress without interfering with other development tasks.
- Developers may work on multiple developmental branches or bugs simultaneously.

There is a hierarchy in branches from the official release version to intermediate merged versions, to local developmental versions.

Testing is performed automatically on individual branches and is required when merging from local branches back to the shared branch and ultimately to the official release branch

# **MELCOR Modernization - Array Flattening**

Motivation:

- Simplifies Coding
- Easier to add new components
- Easier to add properties to all components
- Facilitate debugging
- Performance improvements due to localization
- Improve potential for achieving identical results from restarts
- Finding/reducing cliff-edge effects

As an example, consider the XMDC array as currently written:

Cor%Cell(naxl, nrad)%Cellcomp(kcmp)%New%Xmdc(ncrmat)

Our flattened stride one XMDC array becomes a rank five array dimensioned as follows:

Xmdc(ncrmat, kcmp, naxl, nrad, state)

The memory layout for XMDC is now contiguous in memory and stride one.

Architectural change that manages the execution of physics algorithms Flexible means by which developers can introduce new/alternate physics models Enables the ability of external users to develop alternate physics models without access to source code. An important benefit of the physics manager is that it enables advanced users of the code the option to introduce new algorithms without the need to access or change the existing code base. Potential applications would be simulator vendors, analysts seeking to utilize the code in highly specialized environments, or researchers developing models. This provides a flexible Application Programming Interface (API) that would not require distribution of source code.
